HOUSTON, TX (June 22, 2017)— Pauline Boudry / Renate Lorenz present their first traveling U.S. solo exhibition *Everybody talks about the weather... We don't*, which includes a new major moving image work—*Telepathic Improvisation* (2017)—and two new sculptures.

With reference to current violent social conditions, *Telepathic Improvisation* explores the ways in which others (including other objects) might become part of our striving for alternative political and sexual imaginations. The work reinterprets American composer Pauline Oliveros's 1974 score of the same title using humans and non-humans, movements, speeches, gestures, music, light, and smoke. While the action of the film appears abstract, it nonetheless includes references to specific moments of leftist protest, queer S&M club life, acts of surveillance, and fantasies of new relations between human and non-human objects in an interstellar dimension. The audience is called to communicate telepathically with all of the elements

on-screen, including performers Marwa Arsanios, Werner Hirsch, MPA, and Ginger Brooks Takahashi. Challenging the idea of images as mere depictions of political actions, this filmed performance speaks about productive tensions between the fantasy of an action and the action itself.

Artistic-political methods such as opacity—opposing the principles of rendering the Other transparent—determine the duo's way of creating installations. With their films and sculptures, as well as their placement of screens and objects in space, Pauline Boudry / Renate Lorenz create a dense net of references to the history of art and the often cruel and excluding history of visualization and the gaze. They play with dis/connections between objects and meaning and with the conventional gendering of material. Does the hair of a huge sculptural hair-work refer to a wig? Does it refer to the history of drag performance? Or is it a glamorous prop? When a minimalist object becomes a stage, the visitor suddenly participates in a narrative that hints toward an alternative future.

This exhibition is presented as part of a year-long series of major presentations by Pauline Boudry / Renate Lorenz in the U.S., co-curated by Alhena Katsof in collaboration with the Walker Art Center's Moving Image Commissions, Minneapolis; EMPAC / Curtis R. Priem Experimental Media and Performing Arts Center, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, Troy; PARTICIPANT, INC., New York; and the Contemporary Arts Museum Houston (CAMH). Telepathic Improvisation premiered at PARTICIPANT, INC. in New York and will stream online on the Walker Art Center's Moving Image Commissions page through September 10, 2017.

#### **ABOUT THE ARTISTS**

Pauline Boudry / Renate Lorenz are based in Berlin and have been working together since 2007. Their staged films and film installations have been the subject of solo exhibitions at the Kunsthalle Zürich in Switzerland, the Kunsthalle Wien in Austria (both 2015), the Badischer Kunstverein in Karlsruhe, Germany, and the CAPC musée d'art contemporain de Bordeaux, France (both 2013). Recent titles in their filmography include Silent (2016); I Want (2015); To Valerie Solanas and Marilyn Monroe, In Recognition of their Desperation (2103); and Toxic (2012). Boudry / Lorenz's films have screened at the Berlinale in Germany (2015), the Biennale of Moving Images in
