Theaster Gates: The Gift and The Renege

This content review is designed to communicate accessibility and powerful subject matters within this exhibition.

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Themes: Resilience, Community, Urban Renewal, Historical Memory

Theaster Gates: The Gift and The Renegade explores the complex dynamics of Houston's Freedmen's Town in the Fourth Ward through a collection of large-scale paintings, sculptures, and installations, encapsulating themes of resilience, liberation, and urban transformation. Through his artistic practice, and by intentionally seeking to "add form," Gates interrogates the often-overlooked value of Black spaces in American history, emphasizing Black labor, materials, place, and community.

Featured Works

- 1. *WE WILL SAVE OURSELVES* (2024):** This painting is crafted from torch down, bitumen, and enamel-based industrial paint on steel, may suggest the resilience and self-sufficiency of community efforts, reflecting on the metaphor of self-salvation through collective action. It can be read as a chant, a slogan and speaks to protest posters that aim to be calls to action.
- 2. *Bright Sunny Day* (2024):** Using materials as mentioned above, and spanning 30 feet wide, *Bright Sunny Day* takes a new approach by using roofing shingles to contrast stark urban realities with the persistent optimism that fuels future transformations.
- 3. *Retaining Wall for Revolution and Resurrection* (2024):** Previously featured in the exhibition *How to Sell Hardware*, this installation uses steel gabions filled with hardware store items to represent the robust yet complex foundations that underpin community upheaval and renewal.
- 4. *New Egypt Sanctuary of the Holy Word and Image* (2017):** Made from wood, marble, bound periodicals, and found objects, this piece encourages reflection on the spiritual and historical influences shaping modern Black identity. It includes bound pages from *Ebony* magazine, which were gifted to the artist from the Johnson Publishing Collection.

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Theaster Gates' *Nation Building* (2024) features brick presses as sculpture.

1. *Brick Relief* (Cast in bronze):

Significance: Bronze symbolizes durability and historical importance. Casting a brick press in bronze elevates a common tool, reflecting the enduring legacy and intrinsic value of Black communities and labor.

2. *Stainless Labor* (Crafted entirely from stainless steel):

Significance: Stainless steel's strength and resistance to corrosion metaphorically represent the resilience of Black labor and industry.

3. *Analog Investments* (Made from bronze):

Significance: Using bronze signifies tradition and value, reflecting the substantial impact of Black communities' historical and economic contributions. The term "analog" suggests a return to foundational practices amidst digital change.

4. *The Original Bray* (Constructed from cast iron):

Significance: Cast iron's strength and industrial significance highlight the foundational role of Black labor during the Industrial Revolution.
