

Stonewall 50 April 27-July 28, 2019

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In celebration of the 50th anniversary of the Stonewall Riots, Contemporary Arts Museum Houston (CAMH) is assembling a local, national, international, and multigenerational group of artists whose artworks offer a snapshot of the complexion, interests, and activities of queer and allied communities. The exhibition *Stonewall 50* includes painting, photography, video, sculpture, performance, and media that look back at the Stonewall Riots and ahead at the queer future.

Here is a list of artworks included in the exhibition that contain some challenging content:

- Audience (1982) by Barbara Hammer is a film diary that contains conversations about sex.
- Political Gestures (2018) by Nick Vaughan & Jake Margolin is a video installation that shows scenes of drag queens in various states of undress as they get ready in a dressing room.
- The collage books by artist David Lejeune contain images of graphic sexual imagery.

- Idexα (2008) by Catherine Opie is a photograph featuring a person who is topless.
- The photographs by Paul Mpagi Sepuya show some nudity.
- Artist Thomas Lanigan-Schmidt has several small scale sculptures in the exhibition which contain small nude photographs.
- The site-specific installation by artist Chitra Ganesh references nudity.

The exhibition themes focus on queer communities including trans visibility, conversations between generations of artists, and the reverberations of the Stonewall Riots outside of the United States.
